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A foreword on Burnham on Crouch Primary School's approach to the allocation of the Primary PE and Sports Premium 2025/26

Purpose: This document serves to demonstrate how Burnham on Crouch Primary School effectively plan the use of the Primary PE and sport premium provided by the Department for Education.

This document outlines the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) offered by Burnham on Crouch Primary School and how the school builds capacity and capability within, to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years.
